Beginning of the Ecclesiastical New Year Day for the Protection of our Natural Environment

His Eminence Archbishop Demetrios of America

Beloved Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

On this Feast of the Indiction which marks the beginning of the New Ecclesiastical Year, we are led by our beloved Ecumenical Patriarchate in observing the Day for the Protection of our Natural Environment. The relationship commemoration and observance is significant due to the changing of the seasons, our agrarian heritage in relation to marking time, and the strong foundations of our worship and theology in the relationship of our Creator to His creation. We affirm this in the hymns of this day as we sing, "In wisdom You have wrought all things and have established proper times and seasons for our lives" (Praises of Orthros), and "Author and head of all creation, under whose power lie all times and seasons, O compassionate Lord: crown the cycle of year with Your generous blessings" (Exapostilarion of Orthros).

It is in the divine act of our creation that our relationship to the created order is revealed. Through the power and grace of the Creator bringing all things into existence and in His creation of humankind in His image, we see our unique role as stewards of all that God has made. As Adam and Eve were created and placed in the garden to "tend and keep it" (Genesis 2:15), we have the responsibility to care for and protect His creation. As man and woman were directed by God to "be fruitful and multiply" and to "have dominion over the fish of the sea, over the birds of

the air, and over every living thing that moves on the earth" (Genesis 1:28), we have the authority to manage the created order prayerfully and respectfully to sustain life and to address human and environmental needs. We must also affirm in our relationship with God that through His wisdom and our creative potential, we are able to sustain and protect the natural environment while addressing the environmental challenges and stresses of technological innovation, economic forces, population growth, and natural disasters.

Created in God's image as stewards of the natural order, we are witnesses of the goodness of creation. He saw that all He created was very good (Genesis 1:31), and He established and sanctified time through the order and process of creation (Genesis 2:3). Our awareness of this inherent goodness in all that God has made is known first in our relationship with Him. We also marvel at the beauty, complexity, and function of creation, recognizing divine origin, purpose and goodness. We proclaim the Gospel, guiding all to the revelation of God's grace through Christ. We offer a ministry of hope and transformation, as we help others find healing, assurance, and salvation in Him. Through the prayers and liturgical life of the Church, we journey through each day, each week, the full cycle of the year and our lives toward the glorious fulfillment of time and eternal life in communion with God.


As we commemorate this Feast may we commit our time to the feasts and observances of the Church, to a daily life of prayer and communion with God, and to sustaining our spiritual lives through the disciplines of our faith. May we also affirm that we are created and called as stewards of the created order. From our relationship and communion with God, may we offer a witness of the goodness of His creation and the sanctity of life.



Marking An Historic Commitment



Looking back on a fateful day, the National Philoptochos continues to work to inspire compassion and motivation throughout our Parishes and Chapters towards recognition of 9/11 and through its efforts to raise funds for the Saint Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church and National Shrine at the World Trade Center.

On September 11, 2001, a day that will live in infamy, every American understood that life would never be the same, either in our country or around the world. Within a period of two hours, both 110-story Twin Towers collapsed, taking with them all other buildings in the World Trade Center complex, including Saint Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church. On that day 2,753 unsuspecting people lost their lives.

Bringing about an understanding that it is time to do something, something personal, to promote healing, is the message that Philoptochos members are asked to embrace. It is time for all members to show support for the Saint Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church and National Shrine by offering their personal contributions or by working alongside their Philoptochos sisters to help reach a goal. Our focus is on the rebuilding of the Saint Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church and the creation of the National Shrine. What greater tribute and remembrance to the victims at Ground Zero could there be than the resurrection of a church, a reestablishment of a house of worship, the birth of a place of healing for the world to know on this hallowed ground.



To mark the historic building of the Saint Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church and National Shrine, Philoptochos has commissioned the crafting of a beautiful Sterling Silver Charm. The Charm, which is shown below and will be made available for purchase in the new Ecclesiastical Year, will serve to commemorate the building project and to stand as a symbol of our unity, as together we work to bring about its resurrection. All proceeds from the sale of the Saint Nicholas Charm will be directed towards the benefit of the Saint Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church and National Shrine.



Ideas to Increase Philoptochos Membership Alexis Limberakis and Maria Tamvakologos, Co-Chairs

- At the time of membership enrollment, request comments and suggestions to be returned to the board. Ask for feedback on programs, activities and meeting hours. What is their interest and areas of expertise? Those who feel a part, take a part!
- 2. Meet early with the membership committee to set realistic membership goals. Make every effort to achieve them. Ask your priest to speak from the pulpit about the importance of membership.
- Identify a real need either in your parish or greater community. A cause around which people can rally is likely to increase membership.
- 4. Every September at the start of the new ecclesiastical year, sponsor a Philoptochos "Open House" after Liturgy and distribute an information sheet to potential members.
- 5. Ask those unable to attend meetings, to sign a 'CALL ME ONCE' sheet, where they are asked to volunteer just one time during the year. Being called to help on a limited basis can be manageable for even the busiest person.
- Welcome new families and brides in your community with a phone call and invitation to join Philoptochos. Make sure new members are always introduced at meetings.
- 7. Challenge each board member to recruit a woman who has never been a Philoptochos member. All board members are on the membership committee!
- 8. Keep accurate membership records. Check last year's membership against the current year. Email, call or send a reminder note to members who have not renewed their membership.

- Philoptochos mailings and emails should be sent regularly, keeping members informed of activities. Create a yearly Philoptochos events calendar, so members can plan accordingly.
- 10. Seek out young members of the parish that are technologically savvy to help create a chapter Facebook page, Twitter and Instagram accounts! (Great community service credit for students).

Hellenic College Holy Cross

September Scholarship Appeal

This year marks a new era for our beloved Hellenic College Holy Cross Greek Orthodox School of Theology as the V. Rev. Christopher Metropulos will be installed as its new president in October. We look forward to participating in this very momentous occasion.

This past May, a total of 19 students graduated from Hellenic College and 29 from Holy Cross. There are currently 187 students enrolled in both schools with tuition, room and board starting at \$38,132.

Each September, National Philoptochos has its Scholarship Appeal, which benefits worthy students in the school with twice yearly scholarships. In the spring of 2015, Philoptochos awarded 24 scholarships of \$1,500 and 4 merit scholarships of \$1,000 each. The more money sent to the National Office for this appeal, the more is given out to each student. Over the past ten years, thanks to all our chapters, a total of \$798,700 has been awarded in scholarships including \$79,600 in 2014.

We thank all the Philoptochos chapters for their commitment to the education of our young adults and future spiritual leaders. These students are the future of our Greek Orthodox Church!

Retired Clergy and Widowed Presvyteres Benevolent Fund

Honor your father and mother which is the first commandment with promise that it may be well with you and you may live long on the earth (Ephesians 6:2-3)

Each year, the second Sunday of May and the third Sunday in June are designated to honor our mothers and our fathers. While these holidays are an occasion to remember our parents who raised and nurtured us, as Orthodox Christians we know that it is our sacred obligation to honor our mother and father not just on one or two days a year, but rather to show our appreciation continuously.

In addition to the parents who gave birth to us, there are other individuals who play central roles in our spiritual life and of course, I am referring to our local parish priest and his presvytera. Across this nation, it has been these Fathers and their wives who have raised up countless generations in the Orthodox Faith and nurtured children of the Church with the teachings of Christ and His gospel. Some of these Fathers and Presvyteres, who served during the early years of our Archdiocese before the various pension programs were established, have retired from active ministry and are subsisting on meager pensions.

For this reason, Retired Clergy and Widowed

Presvyteres Benevolent Fund was established and has been sending them a monthly stipend to augment their income. During the past six years since my office assumed responsibility for this Fund, over \$325,000 has been collected and distributed in monthly subsidies to a number of clergymen and widowed presvyteres most of whose total annual retirement incomes range from \$14,500 to \$21,000!

National Philoptochos has designated the month of September as the opportunity for the ladies to make a special collection for the Retired Clergy and Widowed Presvyteres Benevolent Fund and I trust that you will all honor these spiritual Mothers and Fathers by once again generously responding to this year's appeal so that the Fund can continue to offer them the assistance they so need and deserve! Without this assistance, the quality of their life would be greatly diminished. As always, be assured of the heartfelt appreciation of the Archdiocese for all you do as the philanthropic arm of the Church. May you and all your loved ones enjoy a very blessed and productive new ecclesiastical year, filled with the abundant blessings of our Lord.
